

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Purpose of Procedures: Conduct county-wide risk assessment and propose a multi-year internal audit plan aligned to prioritized risks.



Risk Assessment

Conduct Risk Assessment & Develop Audit Plan

- Update understanding of existing County Departments and Divisions

Executive Summary

Risk Assessment & Audit Plan Development

- 1. Conducted Department Meetings
 - 26 meetings
 - 17 county functions and departments
- 2. Conducted Risk & Control Diagnostic
 - Developed agreed upon risk factors
 - Defined risk ratings to measure risk criteria
 - Analyzed risks criteria and control maturity to develop prioritized risk perspectives
- 3. Identified common challenges and priority risk areas
- 4. Developed 3-year internal audit plan (proposed)
 - Audit areas
 - Resource recommendations



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Risk Themes

Key risk themes identified during the risk assessment process and relevant to the development of the County's internal audit plan:

- 1. Decentralized *grant management*: lack of ownership and oversight, identification, reporting, and accounting. *Effect*: departmental silos, inefficiency, error, compliance, lost opportunities for funding, waste/fraud.
- 2. Complex State and Federal *program authorization and funding appropriations*: highly monitored within most divisions and by external entities, eligibility and compliance requirements, reduced training from state agency partners. *Effect*: error, paybacks, loss of funding, employee turnover.
- 3. County *applications and systems*: not fully/consistently utilized, not effectively linked and connected, end user challenges. *Effect*: data privacy and security, inefficiency, error, missed objectives.
- 4. Internal *control awareness*: not consistently communicated or articulated by all departments beyond federal or state statutory requirements and countywide policies; the high-level nature of the first county-wide risk assessment is likely a contributing factor as well. *Effect*. possible control gaps, inefficiency, error, missed objectives.



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Risk Perspectives

Top Risk Areas Based on Risk Assessment Workshop Meetings

1. Grants Management (Finance)

Decentralized identification, application, monitoring, and reporting processes across departments, delayed implementation of Munis module,

- 2. Accounts Receivable (Finance) Decentralized processes from other County departments, invoicing performed by Finance on behalf of other departments, manual application of payments.
- 3. Contract Administration (County Manager's Office) Primary gatekeeper for all contracts, but monitoring of vendor performance is decentralized across departments, manual workflow for contract review and approval.
- 4. Purchasing (County Manager's Office) Oversight for all other departments to follow policy and procedures, manual entry of vendor data into Munis based on processing by PaymentWorks.

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5. Tax Collections (Tax Administration) Primary source of revenue through taxpayer payments processed outside of Munis via Pay-It system



Other Enterprise Risks

We also identified risks that exist outside the scope of an internal audit plan but have potential to impact the County's ability to achieve its Mission and Vision.

- 1. Human Capital Risk
 - Increased concerns over employee health and safety (Sheriff's Office, Human Services – Adult & Aging, Human Services – Child Welfare) caused by the current social and political environment.
 - Increased workload and potential staff burnout caused by growth of the County and its municipalities and resulting requests for services or assistance.
- 2. Reputation Risk
 - Stressed vendor relationships largely attributed to the County's conversion to PaymentWorks in response to prior instance of fraud.
 - Ability to maintain positive relationships with surrounding municipalities to keep pace with increasing requests for services or assistance.

The County should contemplate developing an Enterprise Risk Management program to more broadly assess risks to County mission and objectives utilizing the internal audit risk assessment as a starting point

Project Understanding

The Novi Flats project is a new multi-family residential building being constructed north of the existing Cabarrus County Parking Deck ("CCPD"). The City of Concord has required that the Novi Flats design team provide direct pedestrian access between the new building and the CCPD at Level P5, between column lines A/2-3 of the existing structure. This requires an existing upturned, lateral load carrying post-tensioned perimeter beam (Type UB1) to be partially demolished to facilitate installation of the new walkway and doorway access between the projects. It is noted that this beam also acts as the exterior vehicular barrier for the parking deck at this location.

As original Structural Engineer of Record for CCPD, Kimley-Horn was asked to perform limited structural analysis to determine whether the proposed demolition will compromise the existing lateral or gravity systems.

Analysis Summary

Kimley-Horn performed analysis in accordance with the 2018 North Carolina State Building Code (2015 International Building Code with amendments). The previously developed CCPD RAM Structural System analysis model (3-dimensional structural analysis software) was revised by removing the UB1 beam at Level P5 between column lines A/2-3. The existing structural designs for the column, beam, and foundation between column lines A & B / 1-5 were analyzed to assess whether removal of this one section of beam would require any strengthening to structural elements which remain in place. Serviceability effects, such as deflection of the adjacent slab, were also considered. A summary of the analysis with the removal of the section of the Level P5 beam is noted below:

- 1. **Global stability and lateral analysis**: There was a negligible change observed in the lateral displacement. Story drifts and stability remained within the limits specified by ASCE 7-10.
- 2. **Foundations:** No measurable increase in design forces were observed. The existing size and reinforcement in the pile caps are adequate.

- 3. **Column design:** No measurable increase in design forces were observed. The existing reinforcement is adequate.
- 4. Level P5 Beam UB1: Beam UB1 demolition will lose continuity with column A/2. The remaining section of the upturned beam was conservatively analyzed with a cantilever condition west of column A/4 (ignoring stiffness and strength contribution of the PT slab). Although design forces increased at the column A/3 joint, the existing reinforcing is adequate. Deflection at the end of the cantilever is within serviceability limits.
- 5. Level P5 PT slab: With beam UB1 losing continuity to column A/3, additional forces will likely be imparted on the PT slab between grid lines A-A.3, 2-3. However, this force is anticipated to be small and within the strength and serviceability / deflection limits of the existing PT slab. Furthermore, as previously stated, beam UB1 has adequate strength to support the new cantilevered condition and does not rely upon the PT slab for support.

In conclusion, *no additional strengthening measures are recommended* following the partial demolition of the Level P5 UB1 Beam.

Level P5 Beam UB1 Recommendations

Repair documents have been prepared by Kimley-Horn to provide recommended notes and details for the partial demolition and repair of Beam UB1. The Construction Contractor is responsible to define the means and methods of demolition and construction. Following removal of the beam, repairs will be necessary for the existing column A/2 and PT slab. Additionally, concrete in Beam UB1 will need to be removed beyond the opening to facilitate installation of new post-tensioning end anchorages, new bursting reinforcement, and additional stirrups.

SUBJECT:

County Manager - Fiscal Recovery Funds Spending Recommendation

BRIEF SUMMARY:

In May, staff presented commissioners with information on the American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding, which provides \$350 billion in Fiscal Recovery Funds for eligible state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments to respond to the COVID-19 emergency. The County will receive a total of \$42,043,458.

The County received more than 100 Recovery Grant requests from local organizations totaling over \$110 million. In August, staff provided the Board an overview of the requests received through the Recovery Grant process and other identified needs.

Staff will present a spending plan recommendation for Board consideration and adoption at the regular meeting on September 20.

Motion to approve the American Rescue Plan spending plan and the associated budget amendment and project ordinance.

SUBJECT:

County Manager - FY 21 Funding Re-appropriations

BRIEF SUMMARY:

Funds budgeted in the prior fiscal year (FY21) for land acquisition need to be carried-over to the current fiscal year (FY22) for use. On June 21, 2021, the Board approved the acquisition of two houses located at 436 and 442 Cabarrus Avenue West in Concord. Acquisition and demolition of these two homes will facilitate construction of the new Emergency Equipment Warehouse and Information Technology Services (ITS) building on an adjacent parcel. This transaction was not completed in FY21. Carrying- over these funds from FY21 to FY22, through an appropriation of fund balance, is required to complete the purchase as planned.

REQUESTED ACTION:

This NONEXCLUSIVE POSSESSION AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into this _____ day of August, 2021 by and between CABARRUS COUNTY ("County") and DARRYL S. THOMPSON, SR. ("Thompson").

RECITALS

1. In 2017, the County purchased an approximate 40-acre tract of land in Cabarrus County from Flavia B. Thompson, which was the homeplace for Ms. Thompson and her son Darryl S. Thompson, Sr., which has an address of 13009 Peppercorn Lane, Midland, North Carolina 28107, with a PIN of ______ (the " Property").

2. The County purchased this Property to add to the acreage of Rob Wallace Park, a County owned and operated public park.

3. Since its purchase of the Property, the County has allowed Ms. Thompson and her son to continue to live on the Property. Last year Ms. Thompson passed away. Darryl S. Thompson, Sr. continues to live on the Property and to take care of it.

4. The County plans to add the Property to Rob Wallace Park at some point in the future, but at this time has not appropriated the funds to construct park improvements on the Property or to open up this Property to the public.

5. The County and Thompson desire to allow Thompson to continue to live on the Property and provide for its maintenance, pursuant to the Terms of this Agreement as provided below.

Based on the foregoing Recitals and the Terms contained below, which the parties agree constitute sufficient legal consideration to make this Agreement enforceable, the parties agree as follows:

TERMS

1. Thompson and his family may continue to reside on the Property on a nonexclusive basis. There shall be no rent charged to Thompson during the time Thompson is allowed to reside on the Property pursuant to this Agreement.

2. In return for such possession of the Property, Thompson agrees to maintain the Property and its improvements, including the house, in its present condition, reasonable wear and tear excepted. Thompson shall also provide maintenance of the grounds surrounding the improvements, including the driveway. This includes mowing the fields and general cleanup of the exterior areas.

3. County personnel and such contractors as the County has hired, may enter the Property at any time, excluding the house Thompson resides in. Such personnel and contractors shall attempt to give Thompson advance notice of their arrival on the Property, but such notice is not a condition precedent to such persons being able to conduct their business on the Property. It is understood that

such persons are on official County business, with reference to inspection of the Property, testing of the Property and any additional maintenance of the Property that the County wishes to do.

4. The term of this Agreement shall extend to midnight on December 31, 2023. The term may be extended only upon the agreement of both parties. If the County does not desire to extend the term, the County will give Thompson notice in writing by September 30, 2023. This will allow Thompson time to remove all of his personal property from the Property, it being understood that the amount of such personal property is substantial.

5. To the maximum extent allowed by law, Thompson shall defend, indemnify, and save harmless the County and its agents, officers and employees, from and against all claims of any kind that arise in any manner from, in connection with, or out of this Agreement as result of the acts or omissions of Thompson or anyone directly or indirectly on the Property because of Thompson or anyone for whose acts Thompson may be liable, except for damage or injury caused by the sole negligence of County or its agents, officers or employees. In performing his duties under this section, to the extent allowed by the law, Thompson shall at his sole expense defend the County and its agents, officers and employees with legal counsel reasonably acceptable to County.

6. The County is not requiring Thompson to purchase insurance to cover his possession of the Property, but Thompson understands that his possession of the Property does not provide him with any insurance coverage of any type with the County. Thompson is considered an independent contractor with respect to the County and is his own insurer of any risks arising from his possession of the Property under this Agreement.

7. If Thompson fails to perform any obligation imposed on him by the provisions of this Agreement, the County may, in its discretion, terminate this Agreement, and in doing so shall not waive any of the its right and remedies. Before doing so, the County shall give Thompson reasonable notice of its intention.

8. This Agreement may not be assigned without the written consent of the other party.

9. No action or failure to act by either party shall constitute a waiver of any of its rights or remedies that arise out of this Agreement, nor shall such action or failure to act constitute approval of or acquiescence in a breach of this Agreement, except as may be specifically agreed in writing.







PUBLIC SCHOOL BUILDING CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND BUDGET ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Cabarrus County, North Carolina that, Pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the following capital project ordinance is hereby adopted:

Section I.

- A. The project authorized is the various County construction and renovation related projects. Details of the projects are listed in section C. of this Project Ordinance.
- B. The officers of this unit are hereby directed to proceed with this capital project within the terms of the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and the budget contained herein.
- C. It is estimated that the following revenues will be available to complete capital projects as listed.

Section II.

- A. Special appropriations to non-profit organizations shall be distributed after the execution of an agreement which ensures that all County funds are used for statutorily permissible public purposes.
- B. The County Manager or designee is hereby authorized to transfer appropriations within or between funds, or modify revenue and expenditure projections as contained herein under the following conditions:
 - 1. The Manager may transfer amounts between objects of expenditure and revenues within a function without limitation.

- 2. The County Manager may transfer amounts up to \$500,000 between functions of the same fund.
- 3. The County Manager may transfer amounts between contingency funds which are set aside for a specific project for budgetary shortfalls or upon the appropriate approval of a change order.
- 4. The County Manager is authorized to transfer funds from the General Fund or Capital Reserve Fund to the appropriate fund for projects approved within the Capital Improvement Plan for the current fiscal year.
- 5. Upon notification of funding increases or decreases to existing grants or revenues, or the award of grants or revenues, the Manager or designee may adjust budgets to match, including grants that require a County match for which funds are available.
- 6. The Manager or designee may adjust debt financing from estimated projections to actual funds received.
- 7. The County Manager may enter into and execute change orders or amendments to construction contracts in amounts less than \$90,000 when the appropriate annual budget or capital project ordinance contains sufficient appropriated but unencumbered funds.
- 8. The County Manager may award and execute contracts which are not required to be bid or which G.S. 143-131 allows to be let on informal bids so long as the annual budget or appropriate capital project ordinance contains sufficient appropriated but unencumbered funds for such purposes.
- 9. The County Manager may execute contracts with outside agencies to properly document budgeted appropriations to such agencies where G.S. 153 A-248(b), 259, 449 and any similar statutes require such contracts.
- 10. The County Manager may reject formal bids when deemed appropriate and in the best interest of Cabarrus County pursuant to G.S. 143-129(a).
- 11. The County Manager may reduce revenue projections consistent with prevailing economic conditions, and also reduce expenditures correspondingly.

Section III.

This ordinance and the budget documents shall be the basis of the financial plan for the County of Cabarrus.

- a. The Finance Director is hereby directed to maintain within the Capital Project Fund sufficient detailed accounting records to satisfy the requirements of the law.
- b. The Finance Director is directed to report, at the request of the Board, on the financial status of each project element in Section I and on the total revenues received or claimed.
- c. Copies of this capital project ordinance shall be furnished to the Clerk to the governing Board, and to the Finance Director for direction in carrying out this project.

d. At the completion of a construction project, all unrestricted excess funds are transferred to the General Fund and the portion of the Capital Project associated with the project is closed.



3. PROJECT SITE

The project site will be located at 4300-4400 Gold Hill Road East in Gold Hill, North Carolina. Below please find general survey of the site. No geotechnical testing has been performed on the site. Once a design-build group has been selected, the geotechnical testing parameters will be agreed upon and executed.



4. PROJECT OVERVIEW

The County currently has a 800 MHz, interoperable, five (5) site, twelve (12) channel simulcast P-25 emergency radio system. The County is seeking to add a 6th remote site to the system. The 6th remote site is needed to enhance radio coverage in the eastern section of Cabarrus County. 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SYSTEM DESCRIPTION

2.1 SITE DEVELOPMENT

2.1.1 Project Overview

In a request from Cabarrus County, Motorola Solutions is proposing a site development solution to support the addition of a P25 Simulcast site. This proposal includes the tower structure, site compound, equipment shelter, UPS, and diesel generator. The proposed tower site is to be located at 35-28-45.06 N, 80-20-14.89W in the Northeast portion of Cabarrus County off of Gold Hill Rd E. Motorola Solutions will coordinate this site development solution in accordance with the design assumptions and statement of work.

2.1.2 Design Assumptions

In an effort to provide mission critical communications Motorola Solutions is proposing the addition of a new tower off of Gold Hill Road in Cabarrus County. This additional site will provide additional coverage to the Northeast part of Cabarrus County. The system additions to make this all possible are based on the design assumptions listed below:

- Cabarrus County 6th Site:
 - One (1) new 300-foot Valmont Self-Supporting Tower.
 - One (1) new 12x16 MSB (Motorola Standard Building) provided which includes one 16 KW UPS and 50KW generator (diesel).
 - 75-foot by 75-foot fenced in compound.
 - New Access Road up to 532-feet.
- Tower Loading Studies will need to be performed at both Mt. Pleasant and KFD. Any site/location upgrades ormodifications are the responsibility of Cabarrus County.
- Approved local, State, or Federal permits as may be required for the installation and operation of the proposed equipment are the responsibility of Cabarrus County.
- Any required system interconnections not specifically outlined in this proposal will be provided by Cabarrus County. These may include dedicated phone circuits, microwave links, fiber, or other types of connectivity.
- All existing towers will have adequate space and size to support the antenna network requirements of the system described:
 - 800 MHz Omni Collinear Receive Antenna mounted at 300-feet.
 - 800 MHz Omni Collinear Transmit Antenna mounted at 280-feet.
 - Mt. Pleasant:
 - Primary Microwave antenna to be mounted at 215-feet.
 - Gold Hill:
 - KFD Tower Microwave antenna to be mounted at 270-feet.
 - Mt Pleasant Microwave Antenna to be mounted at 205-feet.
 - KFD Tower:
 - Primary Microwave antenna to be mounted at 170-feet.

2.2 RADIO COMMUNICATION INFRASTRUCTURE

2.2.1 Project Overview

Interoperability is a key component of today's radio systems. Multiple public safety agencies need to be able to communicate with one another as the geographic areas of operation continue to expand. The Cabarrus County P25 Communication system was established to help meet these needs for the users in this County and the surrounding region. Currently, the system is composed of a 5-site, 12-channel simulcast cell that ties into a Motorola Solutions Project 25 Core that resides in Matthews, NC. As the population of Cabarrus County has grown, there is a desire to increase the coverage in these areas.

In an effort to enhance the coverage in the Northeastern parts of the County and parts of Highway 49, an addition of one (1) new simulcast site is proposed for the Cabarrus County simulcast cell. A site at Gold Hill Road would make for the 6th site in the cell and provide coverage to the Northeast portion of the County. As part of the simulcast cell expansion, a backhaul solution has also been provided to incorporate the new site into the existing simulcast ring.

Traditionally, these areas have had coverage issues and a site would enhance the communication in these portions of the County and surrounding areas. In addition, since this site will provide coverage into surrounding counties, interoperable communication is increased into a larger geographic service area. With a greater geographic coverage footprint, this also provides a backup system for neighboring Counties if their prime system were to fail. As with all the P25 sites in the U.A.S.I. network, the additional coverage gained would tremendously benefit all users in the entire region as users could potentially roam through these Counties seamlessly on the specified roaming talkgroups. Lastly, this will increase in building coverage for these areas that traditionally have not had solid radio coverage.

This solution provides the most cost effective way to add coverage and interoperability into the Cabarrus County system. The following section lists an overview of the equipment and a description of the design.

2.2.2 Equipment Overview

The additional site proposal would be part of the Cabarrus simulcast subsystem which currently has 5sites with 12-channels at each location. The term "Simulcast" is used to describe the SIMULtaneous broadCAST of identical information on the same carrier frequency from multiple, geographically separated sites. With Motorola Solutions' Simulcast technology, the critical phase and amplitude of these signals will be held to strict tolerances for optimal performance. One of the important benefits of

a simulcast solution is extended RF coverage. Simulcast is also beneficial in areas where available frequencies are scarce, and in areas where physical barriers (for example, mountains and buildings) can cause deficiencies in signal coverage. Simulcast is bandwidth efficient and enhances coverage.

After the addition, the Cabarrus Simulcast system will have the following RF sites shown below (new site in bold italics).

Cabarrus RF Sites

- Fire Station 3 (Prime/Co-located Remote Site).
- Pitt School Rd (Remote Site).





3.6 SITE DEVELOPMENT

3.6.1 Site Development at Gold Hill

Site Scope Summary

- Engineering services for site drawings and regulatory approvals: Included.

- New fenced compound/expansion size: 75' x 75'.
- Clearing type: Medium.
- Road length requiring improvement: 532-feet.
- New power run: 50-feet.
- Electrical service: Underground, 200-amp 120/240-volt, single-phase.
- New shelter size: 12' x 16'.
- New fuel tank size: 300 gallons, Type: Diesel above-ground.
- New generator size: 50 kW, Type: Outdoor.
- New tower to be used for antennas: 300-foot self-supported tower.
- New tower foundation size: 87 cubic yard, Type: Pier and pad.

Motorola Solutions Responsibilities:

Site Engineering

• Prepare site construction drawings showing the layout of various new and existing site components.

- Conduct site walks to collect pertinent information from the sites (e.g., location of Telco, power, existing facilities, etc.).
- Perform a site and topographic survey for the property on which the communication site is located or will be located.
- Prepare a 2C/1A letter certifying the accuracy of the surveyed data for the tower.
- Perform construction staking around the site to establish reference points for proposed construction.
- Prepare a lease exhibit and sketch of the site to communicate to the property owner the proposed lease space and planned development at the particular site location.
- Prepare record drawings of the site showing the as-built information.
- Conduct utility investigation and coordinate with local utility company for power hook up.
- Perform NEPA Threshold Screening, including limited literature and records search and brief reporting, as necessary to identify sensitive natural and cultural features referenced in 47 CFR Chapter 1, subsection 1.1307 that may potentially be impacted by the proposed construction activity. This does not include the additional field investigations to document site conditions if it is determined that the proposed communication facility "may have a significant environmental impact" and thus require additional documentation, submittals, or work. Regional Environmental Review (RER) report submittals if required by FEMA have not been included. Perform Cultural Resource study as needed to identify sensitive historical and archaeological monuments that might be impacted by proposed construction.
- Conduct up to 80-foot deep soil boring test at each tower leg, backfill holes with spoils and prepare geotechnical report of soil conditions at locations of the tower foundation. Grouting of boring holes or access by Automatic Traction Vehicle (ATV) mounted rig is not included.
- Conduct construction inspection of foundation steel prior to pour, materials testing of concrete and field density tests of backfill to ensure quality construction.
- Perform inspection of the site and the work performed by the Contractor to document that the site is built in accordance with the "Site Plans" and document any deviations or violations.
- Prepare, submit and track application for local permit fees (electrical, building, clearing), prepare FAA filings and procure information necessary for filing.

Site Preparation

- Obtain permits such as electrical, building, and construction permits, and coordinate any inspections with local authorities that may be needed to complete site development work. Permit fees.
- Provide one-time mobilization costs for the construction crews. Any remobilization due to interruptions/delays that are out of Motorola Solutions' control will result in additional costs.
- Perform tree clearing, grubbing and disposal of vegetation in the site compound area and a 10-foot path around it (13225 square feet).
- Perform tree clearing, grubbing and disposal of vegetation in a 20-foot wide access road to the site (not to exceed 532-feet in length).
- Grade the site compound and 10-foot path around it to provide a level, solid, undisturbed surface for installation of site components (not to exceed 9025 square feet).
- Supply and install gravel surfacing to a depth of 6 inches, including herbicide treatment and geotextile fabric installation within the fenced in site compound area, and a 3-foot path around it (not to exceed 6561 square feet).
- Provide a 20-foot wide access road (not to exceed 532-feet in length), including surface grading and graveling.
- Supply and install one (1) 2-foot diameter culvert.

- Construct swales, if required around the compound to control soil erosion (not to exceed 300 linear feet).
- Provide silt fence around the compound to control soil erosion (not to exceed 300 linear feet).
- Supply and install 8-foot high chain-link fencing with a 10-foot wide gate around the shelter compound (not to exceed 300 linear feet).
- Perform site touch up (fertilize, seed and straw) disturbed areas not covered with gravel after completion of construction work, such as landscaping, decorative fencing or any other aesthetic improvement that may be required by local jurisdictions has not been included and will be handled through a negotiated contract change notice.

Site Components Installation

- Construct one (1) reinforced concrete foundation necessary for a 12' x 16' shelter.
- Construct one (1) concrete slab for 300-gallon above-ground diesel fuel tank at 3000 psi with reinforcing steel necessary for foundations.
- Construct one (1) foundation for the 50 kW generator with reinforcing steel necessary for foundations.
- Supply and install prefabricated concrete 12' x 16' shelter.
- Supply and install one (1) 300-gallon Diesel fuel tank(s), fill it with fuel and connect it to the generator.
- Supply and install fuel tank monitors on the tanks to monitor low fuel in tanks and run alarm wiring to the building located within 50-feet of the tank.
- Supply and install one (1) standby power generator (50 kW) located within 20 feet of the ATS, including interconnection wiring between the generator, transfer switch, and site electrical service mains.
- Supply and install one (1) 120/240-volt, 200-amp, single-phase meter pedestal and hookup for electrical service by the local utility.
- Provide all trenching, conduit, and cabling necessary for underground hookup of power to the shelter from nearby utility termination located within 50 cable feet of the shelter.
- Supply and install a perimeter grounding system around the compound and shelter. The ground system is to tie to the fence and all new metal structures within the compound to meet current Motorola Solutions' R56 standards.
- Conduct one (1) three-point ground resistance test of the site. Should any improvements to grounding system be necessary after ground testing, the cost of such improvements shall be the responsibility of Cabarrus County.
- Supply and install one (1) freestanding 24-inch-wide cable/ice bridge from the tower to the shelter (up to 20 linear feet).
- Supply and install one ³/₄" conduit from shelter to gate post for access controls.

Tower Work

- Construct pier and pad type tower foundations including excavation, rebar and concrete (not to exceed 87 cubic yards).
- Erect new 300-foot self-supported tower with strobe lighting.
- Supply and install grounding for the tower base for self-supported towers.

Antenna and Transmission Line Installation

- Install antenna(s) for the RF system.
- Install GPS antenna(s).
- Install tower top amplifier(s).
- Install two (2) 6-foot microwave dishes.

- Install transmission line and EW63 waveguide.
- Perform alignment of each of two (2) microwave paths to ensure that the microwave dishes are optimally positioned.
- Supply and install 24-inch wide cable ladder to support RF transmission lines (up to 290 linear feet).
- Supply and install one (1) ground buss bar at the bottom of the antenna support structure for grounding RF cables before they make horizontal transition.

3.6.2 Microwave Installation at Mount Pleasant Site and Kannapolis FD Site

- Perform a structural analysis and tower mapping at both the Mount Pleasant and Kannapolis Fire Department (KFD) site to support the proposed microwave dishes. If the tower structure fails the analysis, the cost of any site relocation or modifications to the tower required to support the antenna system will be the responsibility of Cabarrus County.
- Install one (1) 6-foot dish at each of the locations, Mount Pleasant and KFD.
- Perform alignment of two (2) microwave paths to ensure that the microwave dishes are optimally positioned.
- Assumes there is adequate microwave capacity in the existing network to tie in the new site to Fire Station 3 Prime Site.
- Assumes that a viable path exists between Gold Hill Tower and KFD Tower.
- Assumes a viable path exists between Gold Hill Tower and Mount Pleasant Tower.
- Motorola Solutions has performed preliminary path calculations and computer path studies. To ensure the reliability of these proposed microwave links, a field path survey will be performed. The microwave design is not finalized until these field path surveys are completed. Should the actual field path survey reveal an obstruction to a clear path for the microwave signal, Motorola Solutions will provide documentation detailing the obstructions and work with Cabarrus County on a design modification. Cabarrus County will be responsible for all cost associated with addressing obstructions to a clear path. This includes (but not limited to) additional microwave equipment, tower modifications, additional microwave sites and tree/foliage removal.

Cabarrus County Responsibilities:

- As applicable, coordinate, prepare, submit, and pay for all required permits and inspections for the work that is the Customer's responsibility.
- Pay for all utility connection, pole or line extensions, and any easement or usage fees.
- Review and approve site design drawings within 7 calendar days of submission by Motorola Solutions or its subcontractor(s). Should a re-submission be required, the Customer shall review and approve the re- submitted plans within 7 calendar days from the date of submittal.
- Pay for the usage costs of power, leased lines and generator fueling both during the construction/installation effort and on an on-going basis. (except first fill up)
- Pay for application fees, taxes and recurring payments for lease/ownership of the property.
- Provide personnel to observe construction progress and testing including but not limited to compaction, soils removal and placement, as well as testing of site equipment according to the schedule provided by Motorola Solutions.
- As required, provide property deed or lease agreement, and boundary survey, along with existing as- built drawings of the site and site components to Motorola Solutions for conducting site engineering at county-owned sites.
- Provide a right of entry letter from the site owner for Motorola Solutions to conduct field investigations.

- Conduct all the testing and documentation (balloon tests, photo simulations, zoning application, expert testimony, zoning drawings etc.) required for the zoning the proposed new tower sites.
- Secure power connection to the site, associated permitting and installation of a meter and disconnect within 50-feet of the proposed shelter location.
- Provide additional temporary space for staging of the construction equipment during the construction of new site facilities (tower, shelter, generator, fuel tank etc.).

Assumptions:

- No prevailing wage, certified payroll, mandatory union workers or mandatory minority workers are required for this work.
- All work is assumed to be done during normal business hours as dictated by time zone (Monday thru Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.).
- All recurring and non-recurring utility costs [including, but not limited to, generator fuel (except first fill), electrical, Telco] will be borne by the Customer or site owner.
- All utility installations shall be coordinated and paid for by the site owner and located at jointly agreed to location within or around the new communications shelter or equipment room.
- Site will have adequate electrical service for the new shelter and tower. Utility transformer, transformer upgrades, line, or pole extensions have not been included.
- Pricing has been based on National codes such IBC or BOCA. Local codes or jurisdictional requirements have not been considered in this proposal.
- Hazardous materials are not present at the work location. Testing and removal of hazardous materials, found during site investigations, construction or equipment installation will be the responsibility of the customer.
- A maximum of 30 days will be required for obtaining approved building permits from time of submission, and a maximum of 60 days will be required for zoning approvals from time of submittal.
- No additional improvements are required for concrete trucks, drill rigs, shelter delivery, and crane access.
- If any additional soils require removal and replacement with stabilized material or fill after proof rolling, has not been included.
- If extremely harsh or difficult weather conditions delay the site work for more than a week, Motorola Solutions will seek excusable delays rather than risk job site safety.
- In absence of geotechnical reports, foundations and subsurface conditions for tower design are based on Presumptive Sand soil parameters, as defined by EIA-222-G Annex F. In addition, rock coring, piling, extensive dewatering of foundations, permanent casings or hazardous material removal has not been included.
- For zoning approvals, a maximum of 60 days will be required from time of submittal with attendance at maximum of two (2) required planning meetings.
- The restoration of the site surroundings by fertilizing, seeding and strawing the disturbed areas will be adequate.
- Tower and foundation sizing is based on the tower loading requirements as a result of the RF Antenna System design and the Microwave Antenna System design (i.e. - dish sizes and locations obtained from paper path studies). If after physical path studies, the dish sizes and locations change, then Motorola Solutions will then review the impact to tower structure and foundations and revise applicable costs.
- If as a result of NEPA studies, any jurisdictional authority should determine that a proposed communications facility "may have a significant environmental impact", the environmental impact studies or field testing and evaluation related to such determination have not been included.
- For new towers greater than 200-feet in overall height, FAA obstruction lighting has been included.

Scope

Application

Motorola Solutions complies with the Drug-Free Workplace Act, applicable regulations of government agencies (including regulations promulgated by the Department of Transportation), and other federal, state and local laws and regulations. All employees and applicants for employment are advised, in writing, of our Drug-Free Workforce and Smoke-Free Workplace Policy.

Drug and/or alcohol testing is conducted in accordance with applicable law(s).

Circumstances that Require Drug and/or Alcohol Testing

- 1. Pre-Employment Drug Testing. All applicants for employment must take and pass a drug test before they receive an unconditional offer of employment and/or begin working for Motorola Solutions. Applicants who refuse to cooperate in a drug test, or who do not pass a drug test, will be ineligible for hire and employment with Motorola Solutions at that time and cannot re-apply for a position with Motorola Solutions for a period of six months following the date of their drug test.
- 2. For-Cause Drug and Alcohol Testing. Motorola Solutions may require that an employee take a drug and/or alcohol test when Motorola Solutions has reasonable suspicion, based on specific observable facts or behaviors, that an employee may be under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or has been using drugs or alcohol while he/she is working, on Motorola Solutions premises, operating a Motorola Solutions vehicle, machinery, or equipment or present in any other location performing services for Motorola Solutions. The observer(s) will document the specific observed facts or behaviors that support the reasonable suspicion. Failure to cooperate or otherwise take a requested for-cause test will result in termination of employment.
 - a. Post Accident Testing. Motorola Solutions may require an employee to take a drug and/or alcohol test when Motorola Solutions reasonably believes the employee may have contributed to or caused a work-related accident that results in serious bodily injury to a person and/or significant damage to Motorola Solutions property. The drug and/or alcohol test shall be administered as soon as practicable following the accident.
- 3. Customer-Mandated Drug and Alcohol Testing. Motorola Solutions may require an employee to take a drug and/or alcohol test when such a test is mandated by a Motorola Solutions customer as part of a contract. Failure to cooperate or otherwise take a customer-mandated test will result in the immediate removal of the employee from the customer project he/she is supporting and may result in further action being taken against the employee.

Testing Procedures

- 1. Employees subject to alcohol testing will be required to sign a written consent form in which they consent to and authorize testing.
- 2. Employees will be sent to a Motorola Solutions designated collection site where they will be required to verify their identity and cooperate in the site's normal specimen collection procedures.
- 3. The collection and testing will be conducted, in private, by a trained technician who will use approved testing devices and testing forms. Chain of custody procedures will be maintained from collection to the time specimen(s) may be discarded so as to ensure proper identification, labeling, record keeping, handling, and testing of specimen(s).
- 4. A screening test will be conducted first. If an employee's screen test result is less than .02, the employee will have passed the test.
- 5. If the employee's measured alcohol concentration is .02 or more, the employee will be required to take a confirmation test. The results of the confirmation test, not the screen test, are determinative. If the employee's confirmation test result is less than .04, the employee will have passed the test. If the employee's confirmation test results is .04 or more, the employee will have tested positive for alcohol.
- 6. The technician will notify Motorola Solutions of the employee's test result in a confidential manner.

Drug Collection and Testing Procedures

Except where precluded by applicable law, Motorola Solutions will follow the procedures set forth below:

- 1. Applicants and employees subject to drug testing will be required to sign a written consent form in which they consent to and authorize testing.
- 2. Applicants and employees will be sent to a Motorola Solutions designated collection site where they will be required to verify their identity and otherwise cooperate in the site's normal specimen collection procedures. Applicants and employees will have the opportunity to disclose any over-the-counter or prescribed medications that they are using or have recently used, or any other information, medical or otherwise, that they think may be relevant to the testing.
- Specimens will be collected, in private, by a trained collection site person who will use approved collection containers and custody and control forms. Chain of custody procedures will be maintained from collection to the time specimen(s) may be discarded so as to ensure proper identification, labeling, record keeping, handling, and testing of specimen(s).
- 4. Collected specimens will be tested by a certified laboratory. The laboratory will test specimens for marijuana, cocaine, opiates, amphetamines, and phencyclidine (PCP) (and such other controlled substances as may be dictated by the circumstances in accordance with the requirements of applicable law). The laboratory will first conduct a screen on the specimen. If the screen test is negative, the laboratory will report to Motorola Solutions that the applicant or employee has passed the drug test. If the screen test is positive, the laboratory will analyze the applicant's or employee's specimen using gas chromatography/mass spectrometry. The laboratory will send the test results to the MRO.

- 5. The MRO is responsible for ensuring the accuracy and integrity of the drug testing process. Applicants and employees must promptly cooperate with the MRO.
- 6. The MRO will advise Motorola Solutions if an applicant or employee has passed or failed the test, refused to cooperate, if a specimen is dilute, or if a test should be canceled. If the MRO determines that there is a legitimate medical explanation for a positive, adulterated, or substituted test result, the MRO will report a verified negative test result to Motorola Solutions. The employee/applicant will be notified of the final decision in writing within ten (10) business days of the Motorola Solutions Drug and Alcohol Program Manager's receipt of the appeal.

Confidentiality of Records

Records relating to drug and/or alcohol testing are maintained and protected in accordance with legal requirements and our standards for privacy and confidentiality of personal health information. Inspections

- A. Special appropriations to non-profit organizations shall be distributed after the execution of an agreement which ensures that all County funds are used for statutorily permissible public purposes.

§ 133-3. Specifications to carry competitive items; substitution of materials. All architects, engineers, designers, or draftsmen, when providing design services, or writing specifications, directly or indirectly, for materials to be used in any city, county or State work, shall specify in their plans the required performance and design characteristics of such materials. However, when it is impossible or impractical to specify the required performance and design characteristics for such materials, then the architect, engineer, designer or draftsman may use a brand name specification so long as they cite three or more examples of items of equal design or equivalent design, which would establish an acceptable range for items of equal or equivalent design. The specifications shall state clearly that the cited examples are used only to denote the quality standard of product desired and that they do not restrict bidders to a specific brand, make, manufacturer or specific name; that they are used only to set forth and convey to bidders the general style, type, character and quality of product desired; and that equivalent products will be acceptable.

Where it is impossible to specify performance and design characteristics for such materials and impossible to cite three or more items due to the fact that there are not that many items of similar or equivalent design in competition, then as many items as are available shall be cited.

On all city, county or State works, the maximum interchangeability and compatibility of cited items shall be required. The brand of product used on a city, county or State work shall not limit competitive bidding on future works. Specifications may list one or more preferred brands as an alternate to the base bid in limited circumstances.

Specifications containing a preferred brand alternate under this section must identify the performance standards that support the preference. Performance standards for the preference must be approved in advance by the owner in an open meeting. Any alternate approved by the owner shall be approved only where (i) the preferred alternate will provide cost savings, maintain or improve the functioning of any process or system affected by the preferred item or items, or both, and (ii) a justification identifying these criteria is made available in writing to the public. Substitution of materials, items, or equipment of equal or equivalent design shall be submitted to the architect or engineer for approval or disapproval; such approval or disapproval shall be made by the architect or engineer prior to the opening of bids. The purpose of this statute is to mandate and encourage free and open competition on public contracts. (1933, c. 66, s. 3; 1951, c. 1104, s. 5; 1993, c. 334, s. 7.1; 2002-107, s. 5; 2002-159, s. 64(c).)

Natural wood veneer was included in the exterior material palette for the EMS Headquarters to provide a warm, organic material to compliment the warm color of brick veneer and to contrast the use of cool colored metal panels. The slat siding is used solely at the main public entry to draw attention to and signify entry. The wood laminate louver system is used at several areas of wide sections of curtainwall for sun shading at places of gathering – conference room and the living area of the EMS station. Wood is a natural choice for the exterior palette and is familiar throughout the area. This particular product is also being used on another Cabarrus County project and helps to tie the County's projects together.

It is our understanding that the manufacturer listed above is presently the only fabricator able to be a single source manufacturer and able to provide both the siding system and a static louver system able to attach to curtainwall outriggers. In order to be able to retain the same product for both the siding and the louver system, we believe a preferred alternate for Parklex as a single source manufacturer is required.

The Johnson Controls Fx system HVAC controls must match the controls used by the majority of the large square footage buildings owned and maintained by the county for ultimate cost and efficiency. Using a different manufacturer will ultimately increase long-term operational costs and different systems will not necessarily provide the same level of remote accessibility for maintenance personnel. Further, additional training will be required for the facilities department personnel to learn additional user interface and operational procedures.

The use of Platinum Building Automation as the Integration Contractor for the project is critical for the interface of county buildings with the existing county global controls. The new building controls will be required to be integrated to the existing control server located in the county government building. This server holds global control information and allows county maintenance personnel to access all of their buildings at a single site. Using a different integration contractor will likely result in a different level of control capability for the new EMS building and will ultimately cost more as a second control maintenance contractor could be necessary for the new building.

Section 1. Overview.

(a) **Parties**. THIS REVOCABLE LICENSE AGREEMENT ("License") is by and between Cabarrus County, North Carolina, a body politic and political subdivision of the State of North Carolina ("Licensor"), and ______("Licensee").

(b) Effective Date. This agreement will begin on _____.

(c) Description of Properties.

(1) **County Property**. Cabarrus County owns the property containing land and improvements located at 484 Cabarrus Ave W, Concord, North Carolina 28027 (PIN 56204434980000) (the "Property").

(2) Licensee Property. Licensee owns the property adjacent to the Property, as more particularly identified as ______ (PIN

(d) **Intent**. Licensee desires to continue to use a portion of the Property (the "Premises") for residential purposes, as more particularly illustrated by the description attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated by reference herein. Licensor is willing to grant this License to Licensee to use the Premises on the terms and conditions set forth below.

Sec. 2. Agreement. For valuable consideration, including the mutual covenants set forth below, Licensor and Licensee agree as follows:

(a) **Premises Uses**. Licensor grants to Licensee a non-exclusive revocable license to use the Premises for residential purposes on the Premises (the "Use"). The Licensee may not substantially change or intensify its present use of the Premises after execution of this License, such as by installing or substantially modifying improvements and fixtures like driveways or storage buildings.

(b) Acceptance. Licensee has inspected and knows the condition of the Premises and accepts the same in its present condition AS IS with no warranty for suitability for use or purpose anticipated by Licensee.

(c) **Term**. The term of this License shall commence on the date set forth above and, shall continue on a month-to-month basis until either Licensor or Licensee provides the other party with a notice of termination (no later than 10 days prior to the end of a monthly term).

(d) **Maintenance and Repair**. Licensee shall maintain the Premises for its use in good condition and repair and shall permit no waste, damage or injury to the Premises arising out of Licensee's Use. Licensee shall promptly repair at Licensee's expense any damage, waste or injury to the Premises which is caused by Licensee, its employees, or agents. Licensee must keep the yard and grounds within the Premises maintained on a regular basis, including mowing, edging, weeding, and debris removal.

(e) Use. During the Term, Licensee shall occupy and use the Premises solely for the Use. It is understood by Licensor and Licensee that this is a License only and Licensee is conveyed no property rights in the Premises. This License only grants Licensee possessory rights in the Premises for the Use and for no other purpose.

(f) **Compliance with Laws and Rules**. Licensee must comply with all federal, state, and local laws, rules, and regulations with respect to the Premises and the Use. Licensee shall always keep the Premises in a clean condition free of debris. Licensee may not use or permit the use of the Premises for any unlawful purpose when using the Premises under this License.

(g) Indemnification.

(1) **In general**. Licensee shall indemnify and hold Licensor harmless and defend Licensor against, all claims arising from:

(A) the occupancy, maintenance or Use of the Premises by Licensee or its employees or agents, including ingress and egress thereto,

(B) the breach or default in the performance of any obligation on Licensee's part to be performed under the provisions of this License,

(C) the negligence or willful misconduct of Licensee or any of its employees or agents, and

(D) all costs, including reasonable attorney fees, expenses and liabilities incurred in the defense of any such action or proceeding with respect to any claim involving subparagraphs (A) through (C).

(2) **Continuing effect**. This subsection shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this License.

(h) **Inspection**. Licensor may enter the Premises at any time for the purposes of examination and inspection of the Premises.

(i) **Surrender.** On the expiration or earlier termination of this License, Licensee shall quit and surrender the Premises peacefully to Licensor in the condition the Premises were in upon commencement of this License, loss or damage by natural wear and tear and permitted alterations as described herein excepted. Upon surrender, License shall also remove any fixtures or improvements located on the Premises owned or installed by the Licensee, including any fences, structures, or driveways. The Licensee must promptly repair any damage caused to the Premises because of such removal. Any property, fixtures, or improvements remaining on the property shall become the property of the Licensor without compensation to the Licensee.

(j) Liens. Licensee shall not subject, or through its actions or inaction allow, the Premises to become subject to any mechanic's lien, mortgage, or any lien of any kind whatsoever.

(k) **Default.** If Licensee violates any of the terms, covenants, Licenses, and conditions herein, and such violation continues for a period of ten (10) days after Licensor's written notice thereof, Licensor may at its option (and in addition to all rights and remedies available at law or in equity) declare this License immediately terminated.

(1) **Waivers**. All waivers of any breach by Licensee must be in writing and signed by a duly authorized representative of Licensor. No waiver by Licensor of any breach by Licensee of any covenant, stipulation or condition contained in this License shall be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same covenant, stipulation, or condition.

(m)**No Assignment**. Licensee may not assign this License to any other party to possess the Premises during the Term. Any purported assignment or transfer of possession in violation of this provision shall be considered a default by Licensee, shall be given no force or effect, and Licensee shall be responsible for any acts or liabilities attributable to the purported assignee of Licensee.

(n) **Heirs and Assigns**. Subject to the above restriction against assignment and transfer, this License shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns of the respective parties.

(o) Notices.

If any dispute arises in connection with the interpretation or enforcement of this License or any default hereunder, or if Licensor or Licensee appears in any proceeding, including any bankruptcy proceeding or any appeal, in regard to this License, the prevailing party in any such dispute shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorney fees, costs, disbursements and other expenses from the nonprevailing party.

(q) **Subordination**. Licensee understands that this License is subject to all, zoning or other ordinances, rules or regulations, easements, restrictions, rights of way, covenants, conditions, reservations, and exceptions of record.

(r) **Entire Agreement**. This License contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to any matter mentioned herein. This License may be modified in writing only, signed by the parties in interest at the time of modification.

(s) **Time is of the Essence.** Time is of the essence of this License, and of each provision hereof.

4. Describe actions taken to eliminate barriers to affordable housing.

Cabarrus County recently worked with a consultant to create a Housing Market Study for the County. The study identified gaps in affordable housing availability. Construction of a new affordable home will provide more affordable homes for the local market and will be available to qualified buyers. This will eliminate competition for low to moderate income buyers from higher income persons and corporations. Staff has worked with the cities of Concord and Kannapolis as well as Prosperity Unlimited to provide homebuyer education, assistance and fair housing education. Cabarrus County also provides Weatherization, Heating and Air Repair and Replacement as well as handicap accessibility improvements to homes to maintain housing affordability for current homeowners and renters. Cabarrus County staff are working with a county wide housing coalition that includes the Health Alliance and other non profit service providers to see how we can work together to deal with affordable housing in our area.

5. Describe actions taken to overcome the effects of impediments to fair housing.

Cabarrus County has worked with the cities of Concord and Kannapolis and Prosperity Unlimited to provide education to the public on fair housing laws. This year we held an online training due to COVID regulations which featured guest speakers from Legal Aid of NC and the Winston Salem Urban League. The Cabarrus County website has a Fair Housing posting in English and Spanish on our website at all times. Cabarrus County runs newspaper as well as television ads on the county's TV Channel 22. Cabarrus County annually reaches out to the local realtor's association to provide education materials for distribution to their members. Cabarrus County has provided materials and technical support to the county's social workers who may discover fair housing issues in their work. The county completed work on an updated Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing. Pamphlets were replenished at the Department of Social Services and the Cabarrus County Governmental Center.
