Prevention Council as the Area Mental Health Director/Designee to complete an unexpired term ending September 30, 2022, including an exception to the residency provision of the Appointment Policy.

(F-2) Appointments and Removals - Mental Health Advisory Board

Partners Health Management became the County's LME (Local Management Entity) September 1, 2021 and the County is no longer affiliated with Cardinal Innovations. Due to this change, it is requested to replace the Cardinal Innovations Healthcare representation on the Mental Health Advisory Board with representation from Partners Health Management. Tara Conrad, Community Engagement Director for Partners Health Management, has submitted an application and is eligible to serve in that position. Ms. Conrad does not reside in Cabarrus County. An exception to the residency provision of the Appointment Policy will be needed for her.

UPON MOTION of Commissioner Shue, seconded by Commissioner Strang and unanimously carried, the Board appointed Tara Conrad to the Mental Health Advisory Board as the Partners Health Management representative, for an unexpired term ending December 31, 2023, including an exception to the residency provision of the Appointment Policy.

A request was sent to The Home and Community Block Grant Advisory Committee regarding vacancies on the Region F Aging Advisory Committee of two delegates and one alternate delegate.

The County has received an application from James Bernacki for one of the delegate positions. Ms. Jean Chandler has agreed to serve another term as the alternate delegate. The HCCBG Advisory Committee feels that both candidates will be valuable assets to the Region F Aging Advisory Committee.

Mr. Bernacki's term would expire June 30, 2023. Ms. Chandler's term would expire June 30, 2022. Ms. Chandler has served on this Board since 2013. An exception to the length of service provision of the Appointment Policy will be needed for her.

UPON MOTION of Commissioner Shue, seconded by Commissioner Strang and unanimously carried, the Board appointed James Bernacki to the Region F Aging Advisory Board as a delegate for a two-year term ending June 30, 2023.

UPON MOTION of Commissioner Shue, seconded by Commissioner Strang and unanimously carried, the Board reappointed Jean Chandler to the Region F Aging Advisory Board as a delegate alternate for a one-year term ending June 30, 2022; including an exception to the length of service provision of the Appointment Policy.

(F-5) DHS - Appropriation of Supplemental LINKS Funding

The Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 116-260) provides supplemental funding for the John H. Chafee (LINKS) Foster Care Program for Successful Transition to Adulthood for young adults who are at least 18 years old and not yet 27 years old and were in foster care at age 14 or older. Young adults who are or were in foster care have experienced job loss and other impacts of the pandemic and many of them have not benefited from prior COVID relief efforts, including stimulus checks. On September 10, 2021, NC DHHS, NC DSS issued funding and instructions to local county Department of Social Services to provide one-time unrestricted payments to this population of very vulnerable young adults. Cabarrus County received \$87,500 in Title IV-B Federal funds and no county match is required.

(F-9) Planning and Development - Soil and Water Conservation District Board - Applications for Farmland Preservation Grants

The Soil and Water Conservation District Board intends to apply for state and federal Farmland Preservation Grants to purchase development rights for permanent agricultural conservation easements on one farm. Farmland Preservation supports goals of both the county commissioners, and the Soil and Water Conservation District Board by improving the quality of life for county citizens. Permanently protecting farmland ensure the land base necessary for the county's agricultural economy, while simultaneously keeping the tax burden low by maximizing the amount of land acreage where the cost of county services is lowest. The Soil and Water Conservation District Board has previously applied for and received grant funding to preserve a total of 360 acres of farmland. Any contracts or cooperative agreements associated with successful grant applications will be submitted to the county for approval.

UPON MOTION of Commissioner Shue, seconded by Commissioner Strang and unanimously carried, the Board authorized the Soil and Water Conservation District Board to submit one or more applications to the North Carolina Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Program Trust Fund, the United States Department of Agriculture, and the Natural Resources Conservation Service's Agricultural Conservation Easement Program for funds to preserve land on one farm with a conservation easement; and authorized the county manager to execute the contract after review and revision by the county attorney.

(F-10) Sheriff's Office - Award of Service Weapon to Lieutenant Luann Andrews Upon Her Retirement

Lieutenant Luann Andrews began her career at the Cabarrus County Sheriff's Office on September 23, 1996 as a sworn Deputy and was assigned to the Detention Center. She was reassigned to the Patrol Division in 1999 and worked there for approximately a year before being reassigned to the DARE/SRO Division in 2000 where she has continued to work until her retirement. She was promoted to Sergeant in this Division in 2009 and was subsequently promoted to Lieutenant in 2014.

She was be sorely missed, not only by her colleagues at the Sheriff's Office, but by the many students, faculty, and School Administrations that have worked with her over these many years.

(F-12) Sheriff's Office - Transfer of Surplus Vehicle

According to their website:

• Concord High School is the first school in North Carolina to offer a Public Safety Academy. The Academy will develop, and guide interested students toward a career in public safety through academics, personal development and in-depth education which will prepare the students to be college and career ready.

Any rising 9th is eligible to join the Public Safety Academy. Students who are admitted to the career academy will begin taking an entry level career/academic cohort class to show the applications of academics in real-world situations. After investigating their career interests and completing an entry level career academy course, students agree to commit to the career academy for the remainder of their academic career.

SkillsUSA is the student organization for law, public safety, corrections and security for the Public Safety Academy, along with other program areas. They provide opportunities for hands-on learning, and for applying career, leadership and personal skills in real-world environments. Participants build their skills by developing projects, attending events, and competing regionally and nationally.

- As part of this training, the Academy utilizes a "mock" patrol unit as part of the instruction. The vehicle they currently utilize is nearing a state of disrepair. A request for assistance in updating their vehicle has been received and a vehicle has been identified by Cabarrus County Fleet Maintenance as their replacement.

- 4. Should the incumbent of this office be re-elected and take office in December 2022, he shall retain his current compensation as provided by Cabarrus County.
